TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2016.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's constitution, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS102. The Trustees have complied with the duty in section 4 of the 2006 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission.

Structure, governance and management

The charity was set up in 1990 and established by Charitable Trust deed dated 19 January 1992.

The Trustees have extensive experience in charitable and commercial organisations. Currently, combined, they have 120 years' experience as Nacoa Trustees and provide stability for the charity that its callers often lack. Trustees are recruited as referrals from Members or as a reflection of commitment to the organisation as a volunteer. The Trustees actively seek new candidates to complement and add to the pool of expertise available to Nacoa.

The Board of Trustees meets four times per year. The Consultative Council provides expertise and professional advice pro bono as required. The Chief Executive manages the day to day operations of the charity and oversees operational matters including volunteer and project management, training and performance related activity. The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives

The charity's objectives are to provide information, advice and support for everyone affected by a parent's drinking or a similar addictive problem. This includes children of all ages, many of whose problems only become apparent in adulthood. The activities adopted by the charity are:

- To offer information, advice and support to children of alcohol-dependent parents;
- To reach professionals who work with them;
- To raise their profile in the public consciousness; and
- To promote research into the problems they face and the prevention of alcoholism developing in this vulnerable group.

Review of the year (including financial review)

Since 1990 the Nacoa helpline has responded to 300,000 requests for help by telephone, email and letter. In addition, the website provides a safe space where children affected by their parent's drinking find relief from their isolation and loneliness, a constant reminder that they are not alone, that others know how it feels to struggle with a parent's alcohol problems. The five founders wanted today's children to have the help and support they did not have and today Nacoa provides free, inclusive and accessible services, which put the needs of callers at the forefront of all activities.

Responding to and reaching out to this vulnerable group would not be possible without the extraordinary commitment and passion of volunteers who in 2016 contributed over 10,500 hours. They are the most compassionate people many of them having lived with parental alcohol problems and share the founders' need to ensure things are different for today's children. Today there is hope, help and support. Today there is Nacoa.

In 2016, 36,078 helpline calls and emails were received (32,338 in 2015). In addition, many services now take place online with increasing visits to the website with a record number in response to media coverage of work connected to the APPG. Nacoa also increased its visibility on the digital platform in all areas of social media and working co-operatively with Josh Connolly's new blog 'COAisathing' and YouTube films.

2016 was a challenging year for a small charity which finds it hard to be heard over the clamour of other charities, hundreds of times bigger and with colossal budgets. However, it was gratifying to see Nacoa's study identifying the scope and scale of the problems, informed much of the discussion in the media as new Patron, The Right Honourable Liam Byrne MP, spoke publically about his own experience of growing up with a parent who drank too much.

Mr Byrne went on to set up The APPG on Children of Alcoholics which was launched at the David Stafford Memorial Lecture held at the House of Commons in February 2016. He spoke to an audience of 250 Nacoa trustees, members, volunteers and others working in the field of addiction, which applauded his passion and commitment to dismantling the silence and stigma which traditionally has kept this vulnerable group hidden. He also encouraged all there to talk properly about alcoholism.

Throughout 2016 Mr Byrne and Nacoa worked together to raise the profile of how children are affected by their parent's drinking whilst acknowledging that this is not what parents want for their children, the whole family needs help. In September the first meeting of the APPG took place gathering evidence from Nacoa, The Children's Society, Turning Point and AdFam.

The Nacoa Volunteers Awards Evening in June 2016 was attended by HM Lord Lieutenant of Bristol, Mrs Mary Prior and The Right Honourable Lord Mayor of Bristol, Councillor Jeff Lovell and the Lady Mayoress. The awards were presented by Liam Byrne who described his experience of Nacoa as a family with the feeling of 'coming home'. Mr Byrne and Ms Cherie Lunghi were welcomed as new Patrons.

Nacoa was invited to take part in the National Citizenship Service in August and September 2016 providing a series of ten sessions throughout Norfolk and the South West and were successful in gaining support from the young people. The Nacoa facilitators provided their time and skills for free.

In November 2016, Nacoa was honoured to welcome HRH The Duke of Kent to the Nacoa office where he met Patrons, Trustees, members, volunteers and funders. He asked many questions and spent time listening to people who had personal experience of growing up with parental alcohol problems and how Nacoa helps.

Later HRH The Duke of Kent wrote to convey his thanks for such an insightful and warm welcome to Nacoa saying the work that the charity is undertaking is such an important one and that he was very taken by the stories told to him of how Nacoa had supported them and made a genuine and important impact on their lives.

In 2016, Nacoa received more messages than ever before about the positive impact the Nacoa helpline and website has on children, young people and adults. These real voices will help to inform future work and the preparation for a study reviewing the helpline service over 16 years began. This is the second study produced pro bono by Drs Anne-Marie Barron and Alan Leigh who had also produced 'Nacoa and its Volunteers: The Contribution of the Nacoa Foundation Training Programme', a seminal study which successfully guided Nacoa through difficulties faced in 2013/2014.

Reassuringly, in 2016, members being regular donors also continued their historic support totalling £28,091 (£26,934 in 2015). Legacy and in memoriam donations of £1,827 (£1,801 in 2015), were also received in the year and a list of everyone remembered is listed in the 2016 Annual Report.

A total of £101,417 was raised (£107,238 in 2015) which with careful cost control resulted in a reduced deficit for the year of £31,828 (£38,404 deficit in 2015). This was achieved by continuing to employ stringent measures by reducing outgoings, whilst responding to an increasing numbers of requests for help in response to unprecedented press and media coverage and the set up costs of Online Message Boards, a new helpline service. Total helpline costs were reduced to £124,889 (£132,477 in 2015) with total costs reduced to £133,245 (£145,642 in 2015).

In October 2016, Nacoa was served with a notice to quit Trelawney House. The hope that the 2015 move to new premises would provide a long term reliable base was short lived when the building was sold and all tenants given notice. At the time of writing, Nacoa is settled at Windmill Hill City Farm with reduced outgoings and looking forward to a long and happy association with the Farm.

2016 is a year which brought unforeseen problems and great triumphs. With the central influence of Nacoa's research and services behind the APPG, the real voices of hitherto silent voices are being heard as government and others listen.

Nacoa is proud of its community of the many people who are passionate about making a difference and has been especially grateful for the close association with HM Lord Lieutenant of Bristol, Mrs Mary Prior without whose help being awarded The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service in 2012 may not have happened. Nacoa wishes her well as she retires from her role in 2017.

This community was referred to in a letter of support from the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby in which he said:

"I want to send my greetings and gratitude for what you do. I wish you have been around (or if you were, that I had known of you) when I was growing up. You are so important because you can be the source of a real community, that merely by existing and accepting, offers the chance of healing and the hope of purpose to people whose lives have been disrupted and diminished by the effect of alcohol abuse in someone whom they love."

Full details of Nacoa's accomplishments against objectives for 2016 and plans 2017 are reported in the 2015 and 2016 Annual Report which is filed with the Charity Commission. Key management personnel

The trustees consider the board of trustees and the chief executive as comprising the key management personnel of the charity in charge of directing and controlling the charity and running and operating the charity on a day to day basis. All trustees give of their time freely and no trustee remuneration was paid in the year. Details of trustee expenses are disclosed in note 6 to the accounts.

Trustees are required to disclose all relevant interests and register them with the chief executive and in accordance with the charity's policy withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises. The pay of the charity's chief executive is reviewed annually.

Reserves policy

There is no formal reserves policy however the Trustees try to ensure at least six months' expenditure are held in reserves. There are no large unbudgeted expenditure plans as at 31 December 2016 and there are sufficient reserves to cover at least five months' expenditure.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

1 Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation and assessment of going concern

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these financial statements.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the financial statements, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 a restatement of comparative items was needed. No restatements were required.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in the furtherance of the general objectives of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside by the trustees for specific purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the fund provider. Details of individual restricted funds are given in note 13.

Incoming resources

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations, are recognised when the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that those conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Legacies are recognised on a case by case basis following the granting of probate when the administrator/executor for the estate has communicated in writing both the amount and settlement date. In the event that the gift is in the form of an asset other than cash or a financial asset traded on a recognised stock exchange, recognition is subject to the value of the gift being reliably measurable with a degree of reasonable accuracy and the title to the asset having been transferred to the charity.

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

1 Accounting Policies (continued)

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as liabilities are incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the independent examination fees and costs linked with the strategic management of the charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly; others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life at the following rates.

Fixtures, fittings & equipment - 25% per annum straight line Motor vehicles - 25% per annum straight line

Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Operating lease expenditure

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Financial instruments
